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INTRODUCTION

On December 1st, AIMS College of Pharmacy observed World AIDS Day with an impactful educational initiative held across the B. Pharmacy classrooms. Recognizing that healthcare professionals are the first line of defense against misinformation, the program was designed to bridge the gap between clinical knowledge and social empathy. By focusing on the themes of 'Ending Stigma' and 'Global Awareness,' the event provided a platform for students to discuss the causes, precautions, and social challenges associated with HIV/AIDS.

Session 1: First-Year B. Pharm (FY B. Pharm)

The event in the First-Year B. Pharm classroom was led by Ms **Sakshi Singh**, who served as the host and ensured the program flowed professionally. The session focused on teaching the students about the basics of the HIV epidemic and the many social challenges that come with it. During the program, two student speakers, **Mr. Aditya Deman and Ms. Avni Murkute**, delivered very moving and informative speeches. Their speech were centered around three core thematic pillars:

- **Stigma and Discrimination:** The speakers highlighted the profound social isolation often faced by patients, advocating for a shift from judgment to empathy within the healthcare system.
- **Precautions and Prevention:** They provided a comprehensive overview of the practical, evidence-based steps required for effective safety and transmission control in clinical and social settings.
- **Causes and Information Gaps:** A significant portion of the discussion was dedicated to identifying how a lack of public knowledge and the persistence of misinformation directly contribute to the continued spread of the virus.
- **The Power of Testing:** They encouraged regular check-ups and explained that knowing one's status is the first step toward a healthy life.

Session 2: First-Year D. Pharm


Simultaneously, a diverse awareness session was conducted in the D. Pharm wing, hosted by **Ms. Aditi Mhatre**. Recognizing the importance of reaching people through their native tongues, students delivered speeches in multiple languages to emphasize that health awareness transcends linguistic barriers. Under her guidance, the session became a collaborative space where students felt empowered to share vital health information in Marathi, Hindi, and English, making the awareness drive more inclusive and effective.

Ms. Samruddhi Sutar spoke in **Marathi**, while Ms. **Nysa Shaikh** and Ms. **Nikita Yadav** delivered their message in **Hindi**. Additionally, Mr. **Bhushan Joshi**, Ms. **Chandana Manimadhya**, and Ms. **Manasvi Munde** presented in **English**. - **Understanding the Virus:** They explained what HIV is in simple terms to remove fear.
- **How it Spreads:** They cleared up common myths, explaining that you cannot get AIDS through casual contact like shaking hands or sharing food.
- **Supporting Patients:** They spoke about the importance of being kind and supportive to those affected, rather than judging them.

The event reached its climax with a powerful concluding speech by **Mrs. Deepali Yevale**. She addressed the gathering on the critical nature of AIDS as a social stigma. She emphasized that as future pharmacists, students play a vital role in patient counseling and community education, making it essential to treat the subject with both scientific accuracy and empathy.
